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TOWN OF BEAVER COUNCIL MEETING FEBRUARY 28, 2008



The meeting was called to order by the Mayor and all recited the Pledge of Allegience. The following answered roll call: Mayor Kriesel, Recorder/Treasurer Hill, Councilmen Bill Padgett, Pam Teslow and Rick Pennington. Cathy Shusta was absent and one position remains vacant.

The Minutes and Treasurer Reports were approved with the following changes: Change method of accounting from accural to cash and separate accounts so that there is no "miscellaneous". Motion to approve was by Bill Padget with Pam Teslow seconding. The motion passed unanimously.

Motion was made by Pam Teslow, seconded by Bill Padget, to roll over the CD maturing on March 5th to best rate possible. Vote was unanimous.

Park Update: There were six applicants for management and when called they were already employed. Former Manager, Jim Dikes, is to refer applicants who were not accepted for the Branson position.

Telephone yellow pages for the Park: Pam Teslow moved and Bill Padget seconded to cancel the Phone book advertisement. Motion passed unanimously.

Park Needs Money: Pam Teslow moved and Rick Pennington seconded a motion to transfer \$2400 from the Town General Fund to the Park Bank of Eureka Springs Fund to cover expenses until the Park opens April 1st. Bill Hill is to draw up a contract for the procedure and present it at the next meeting. Motion passed unanimously.

Salary Issues: Pam Teslow moved and Bill Padget seconded a motion to pay all of Patti Summerville's salary from the Town General Fund and to reduce the Mayor's salary to \$200 until the Park is going again. Motion passed unanimously.

Other Business: Bill Padget moved and Rick Pennington seconded a motion to allow the Mayor to attend a conference on tourism in Rogers not to exceed \$175 in costs. Motion passed unanimously.

The Mayor will write an article for the newspapers about the Park needing a manager.

Adjournment: Pam Teslow moved and Bill Padget seconded a motion to adjourn at 11 a.m.

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CONTRACT FOR FREE ENTRY TO BEAVER PARK BY ALL TOWN RESIDENTS AND THEIR RESIDENT GUESTS

THIS AGREEMENT has been entered into this day between the TOWN OF BEAVER, ARKANSAS ("the TOWN") and the BEAVER CAMPING AND RV PARK ("the Park", "the CONTRACTOR"), for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein set forth.

- 1. **COMPENSATION**. A one-time payment of TWENTY-FOUR HUNDRED DOLLARS AND NO CENTS (\$2,400), delivery of which is hereby acknowledged.
- 2. **DUTIES AND INSPECTION**. Duties of the CONTRACTOR shall be to grant free admission licensing any and all TOWN residents and/or their resident guests to day use of the Contractor's premises. It is understood by both parties, that this free admission is to extend only to day use, and that any overnight camping or RV parking, shower use, or dump station use, by Beaver residents or their resident guests must be paid for separately. Residents of Beaver may be required to show identification at the Park kiosk until the attendant(s) come to recognize them. Resident guests of Beaver residents may be required to show a permission note signed by a Beaver resident until the attendant(s) come to recognize them.

4. **DEFINITIONS.**

- a. "Beaver residents" means any person of any age who owns or resides in a permanent dwelling situated within the corporate limits of Beaver, Arkansas.
- b. "Resident guests" means any person temporarily residing with a Beaver resident.
- 5. **TERMINATION**. This agreement shall be terminate at the end of the 2008 Park season.
- 6. **NO AUTOMATIC RENEWAL**. This agreement shall not be automatically renewed.
- 7. APPLICABLE LAW; INTEGRATION; NO WAIVER. This agreement is drawn to be effective in and shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Arkansas. No amendment or variation of the terms of this agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the CONTRACTOR(S) and duly authorized representative of the TOWN. A waiver of any of the terms and conditions hereof shall not be construed as a general waiver by the TOWN, and the TOWN shall be free to reinstate any such term or condition with or without notice to CONTRACTOR(S).

SUBJECT: Park Plan DATE: March 26, 2008

The following park plan is presented for your review. Please provide feed back as soon as possible. If this meets with your approval I will implement the plan immediately.

THE PLAN

Bill and Sandy Hallary from Shell Knob are eager to serve as camp managers for Beaver Town RV Park. They were introduced to the council at the last council meeting.

There are some details to be worked out, because we do not yet have a work-camper couple to assist. The couple that we had hoped would serve in that capacity has accepted a position in Colorado. Therefore, we will renew the ad in the magazine and continue our search.

In the mean time, adjustments have to be made. We are developing a plan to provide days off for Bill and Sandy. To that end I suggest that two days each week we operate the park in the manner that many other small parks operate. Leatherwood operates in this manner, so I intend to ask for guidance there. Basically many parks do not have the gate house staffed during slow times.

Since almost all of our campers make reservations ahead of time, a space is then assigned and prepayment is made. When they make the reservation, they will be instructed as follows: "If the gate house is not staffed proceed to your assigned site. In case you forget your space number, your name and site number will be posted on the door of the gate house. Since a packet containing park rules etc. is prepared at the time the reservation is made, the packet can be placed at the site awaiting their arrival.

Of course a few campers arrive without a reservation. That can be handled in a similar way. Thy will be instructed to pick a site from the "Available Spaces List". The instructions will further instruct campers to expect a knock on the door at a later time to complete the registration process.

The phone will have to be placed on "Call Forward" during the times the gate house is closed.

Since Tuesday and Wednesday are usually very slow days, I expect that those will be the days off for Bill and Sandy. Chris Lester and I have agreed to assist during those times. We will patrol the park, collect fees from unregistered campers, check for cleanliness, etc. Help from other town residents will also be solicited.

RE: Financial Controls

Since we are about to start another year of park operation under some form, I think it would be wise for the Town to revisit the subject of financial controls. In particular:

- a. We should ensure that any business dealings with the Park by Town officials have been specifically authorized by the Town Council, in accordance with our Town Code.
- b. We should ensure that prenumbered receipts are used for all cash transactions at the Park.
- We should ensure that all eash transactions result in the issuance of a prenumbered receipt.
- We should ensure that two persons at least one a Town official are involved in all cash accounting and depositing.
- We must ensure that a contractor is not in sole control of Park cash transactions.

There may be other helpful financial control ideas that the Town Council can contribute based on their past experiences, and so I would suggest that this subject be added to a future Town Council agenda.

The Park swim platform was located in Eagle Rock and the Mayor is working to having it towed back to Beaver and the State will clean up the debris when the water goes down. The Mayor is still investigating alternative waste disposal systems.

Pam Teslow moved, seconded by Cathy Shusta, to adjourn the meeting at 7:20p.m. The vote was unanimous. The next meeting will be May 12th at the Firehouse.

Dear Mr. William Hill,

This response is in reference to you April 23, 2008 letter regarding recent flood damages at Beaver RV and Camping Park. We understand the situation you are in, as we manage 14 recreation areas on Table Rock Lake that have received significant damage as a result of the high lake levels. We have some preliminary estimates of damage and they are in excess of \$3 million in damages to our recreation areas. Unfortunately, it doesn't appear that we are going to receive any additional funding in the immediate future to address the damages in these parks once the water recedes.

As we will not have nearly enough funding to repair our damages, I'm sorry to say we cannot assist you at this time. We do not have any special procedures or funding programs that can assist with funding. As you, we are currently recruiting volunteers to assist with our clean up in our recreation areas. We will continue to pursue Challenge Cost Share opportunities with the private sector in campsite and recreation area rehabilitation. The historical high water will require a lot of work to restore these recreation areas. We appreciate your concern and efforts you make to provide valuable recreation experiences at Beaver RV and Camping Park.

Re: Your Request to Detach Your Acreage from Beaver Town

Dear Mr. Kepford:

The Mayor has given me a copy of your April 15, 2008 e-mail to the Mayor which seems to again raise your desire to detach your land from the Beaver town corporate limits. I was given one page apparently from you to the Mayor which is a copy of page 6 of some unidentified source document with the heading, "D. Detachment" and summarizing several Arkansas statutes. There is a marginal notation around item number three, "ACA 14-40-1901-1903,"

Provides that the city Council made by resolution provides for the detachment from said city or town of any area which for more than 10 (10) years has not been recognized by city officials and is deemed unsuitable for urban development, and petition to the county court for detachment of the designated area, and after a hearing upon such petition by the county court, order may be issued excluding such territory from the corporate limits.

along with a note that "I think item number three covers what we are talking about." Although I was not present, I understand this matter was raised at last night's town Council meeting and that it was tabled for further consideration later. This is a request for more information from you, in writing.

As you know, we have previously discussed this matter by telephone. As you may recall, I

concluded at that time that there appeared to be no benefit to the town of Beaver in incurring the costs of researching the issue or carrying out any necessary surveys, or in spending the time or efforts by town officials preparing petitions to the County Court to attempt to effectuate your special request. I did suggest that if you cared to bear these burdens yourself that you were certainly free to do so, subject to the town Council's agreement and approval.

- 1. I believe I understand that part of your land is inside the town limits and the part on which your house is located is outside the town limits. I am unclear as to exactly how much of your acreage is within the town limits. To help us understand your concern, I suggest that an accurate scaled plat might be helpful, if you cared to provide one. I am sure that a local surveyor could assist you with this.
- 2. During our previous conversation, I understood that the main reason you wish to detach your property from the town was that you believed it would be more valuable for resale if it were not subject to the town's zoning ordinance. I mentioned to you that no doubt some buyers would be grateful for the protection accorded by the zoning ordinance and that your present or future neighbors whose adjoining land is within the town limits may also be grateful for the protection afforded by the zoning ordinances. In any case, last time I looked, the town had the right to apply its urban planning rules out five miles beyond the town limits. Further, the town has the right to annex land adjoining the town limits to bring that greater land area within the municipal limits, and this extension of planning rules beyond the town limits is intended, I think, to protect the town's annexation right. However, that annexation right is limited, among other ways, to 10% of its present size thus, for the purpose of preserving its fullest annexation rights, Beaver town has an interest in maintaining its present size and no interest in shrinking.
- 3. To me, there does not appear to be any immediate advantage to the town in reducing the land area that has been within the municipal limits since its inception. I have been told Beaver town's town limits at one time extended across the White River to the Missouri Border. I have been told that the town was originally incorporated in that way in part to secure the commercial tax benefits of "border town" status, like Texarkana. However, that cession of territory was done for the clear benefit to the town of not conflicting with the Holiday Island Suburban Improvement District. In this instance, there does not appear to be any reason why Beaver town should want to "throw back" any of its present territory to the County. Beaver town may well wish to expand in the future, but I presently see no reason why it should contract further. If you can articulate persuasive benefits to the town of Beaver of detaching your specific land acreage, please send those to me and I will forward your rationale to the Mayor to consider presentation to the town Council.
- 4. In general, it seems to me that while the town Council might choose to rid the town of some burden by "throwing back" some unwanted portion of its territory to the County subject to application by the town to the County Court and subject to its acceptance of the

land – unless there is some statutory basis, <u>no one</u> may simply choose to withdraw from any governmental jurisdiction – not from the United States, not from a State, not from a county, and not from a city or town. My research has not uncovered <u>any</u> statutory basis which would permit you to choose unilaterally to withdraw from Beaver's jurisdictional territory. At some time, virtually everyone probably feels subjectively that some governmental entity's rules may be confining or irksome – but none of us can simply unilaterally declare ourselves outside those rules.

We thank you for your consideration and assistance.

Attachment 1: Full Text of ACA 14-40-1901-1903

14-40-1901. Designation by resolution.

- (a) Whenever it appears that the official corporate limits as shown by the records of the Secretary of State for any city or incorporated town have for more than ten (10) years included an area or territory that has not been recognized by city or incorporated town officials and assessed for taxation as a part of the city or incorporated town during the period, because of error or otherwise, and which has not been legally detached from the city or incorporated town, then the city or incorporated town council may, by resolution, designate and determine for any portion of the area or territory which it believes is unsuitable for urban development in the foreseeable future, that it is no longer necessary for corporate purposes, and that it desires to officially detach the designated area or territory outside of its corporate limits, retaining the remainder of the unrecognized territory therein.
- (b) A certified copy of the resolution shall then be filed with the county court of the county where the city or town is situated or the county where the area or territory affected is situated, together with a petition that a hearing be held by the court to determine whether the designated portions of the area or territory shall be officially excluded from the city or incorporated town limits.

History. Acts 1961, No. 92, § 1; A.S.A. 1947, § 19-325.

14-40-1902. Hearing and determination.

- (a) Upon the filing of the petition, the county court shall set a date for hearing thereon, not less than fifteen (15) days nor more than thirty (30) days after the first publication of notice of the filing of the petition. Notice of the filing shall be published once each week for not less than two (2) weeks in a newspaper having a general circulation in the city or incorporated town.
- (b) (1) After hearing the petition, if the court shall be satisfied that the designated area or territory has not been recognized by city or incorporated town officials and has not been assessed for taxation as a part of the city or incorporated town for more than ten (10) years, that it is no longer suitable for urban development, that the territory to be excluded is accurately described, and that the welfare of the inhabitants and property owners of both the city or incorporated town and of the area or territory affected will be best served, it shall make an order excluding designated area or territory described in the petition or such portions thereof as it determines should be so excluded from the limits of the city or incorporated town and remitting it back to the county.
- (2) The clerk of the county shall certify a copy of the order to the recorder of the county, to be recorded by him, and shall likewise cause a certified copy to be forwarded to the Secretary of State, to be otherwise filed as provided by law.

14-40-1903. Public utility service.

Any public utility serving the area detached shall have the right to continue to serve in the detached area on the same basis as service had been previously rendered prior to the action of the city or incorporated town council in adopting the resolution detaching the territory, except that no franchise tax shall be payable thereafter to the city or incorporated town.

Attachment 2: Annexation Statute

14-40-302. Authority — Exceptions.

- (a) By vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the total number of members making up its governing body, any municipality may adopt an ordinance to annex lands contiguous to the municipality if the lands are any of the following:
 - (1) Platted and held for sale or use as municipal lots;
 - (2) Whether platted or not, if the lands are held to be sold as suburban property;
- (3) When the lands furnish the abode for a densely settled community or represent the actual growth of the municipality beyond its legal boundary;
- (4) When the lands are needed for any proper municipal purposes such as for the extension of needed police regulation; or
 - (5) When they are valuable by reason of their adaptability for prospective municipal uses.
- (b) (1) Contiguous lands shall not be annexed when they either:
- (A) Have a fair market value, at the time of the adoption of the ordinance, of lands used only for agricultural or horticultural purposes and the highest and best use of the lands is for agricultural or horticultural purposes; or
- (B) Are lands upon which a new community is to be constructed with funds guaranteed, in whole or in part, by the federal government under Title IV of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 or under Title VII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1970.
- (2) Any person, firm, corporation, partnership, or joint venturer desiring to come within this exclusion must have received from the Department of Housing and Urban Development a letter of preliminary commitment to fund the new community under one (1) of the federal acts.
- (3) If any lands are annexed that are being used exclusively for agricultural purposes, the lands may continue to be used for such purposes so long as the owner desires and the lands shall be assessed as agricultural lands.
- (c) However, a municipality having a population of fewer than one thousand (1,000) persons shall not annex in any one (1) calendar year contiguous lands in excess of ten percent (10%) of the current land area of the municipality.

14-40-1801

1. Whenever any municipal corporation shall desire to throw any portion of the territory lying within its corporate limits outside of such limits and remit it back to the county in which such municipal corporation is situated, it shall be lawful for the council of such municipal corporation to submit the question to the qualified electors of such municipal corporation at an election to be held for that purpose after having given notice of such election for four (4) weeks by advertisement in one of the papers published in such municipal corporation, or if there be no newspaper published in such municipal corporation, by an advertisement posted in two (2) of the most con-

 If a majority of the votes cast on the question shall be in favor of throwing such territory outside its corporate limits, the said municipal corporation shall present to the county court a petition praying for such change in its territory limits.

spicuous places in said municipal corporation.

3. Also, ACA 14-40-1901 — 1903 provides that the city council may by resolution provide for the detachment from said city or town of any area which for more than ten (10) years has not been recognized by city officials and is deemed unsuitable for urban development, and petition to the county court for detachment of the designated area, and after a hearing upon such petit areby the county court, order may be issued excluding such territory from the corporate limits.

4. ACA 14-40-608 provides a procedure for individual landowners to detach property that has been annexed. The property must be located on the boundary of the city or town and must not have received utility services from the city or town. A landowner has three years from the annexation to request the municipality to detach the property. The request must be made by an affidavit submitted to the city clerk. The governing body of the city may then within thirty (30) days pass an ordinance to detach the property.

5. Special detachment procedures are provided for regional airports. The airports are not subject to municipal ordinances or other municipal rules or regulations. A regional airport can detach from a municipality by a majority vote of the airport authority. Detachment is permitted after the city or town in which the airport is located is consolidated or annexed into another municipality.

SIMULTANEOUS DETACHMENT AND ANNEXATION

1. When the boundaries of two minicipalities are contiguous and adjoining one municipality may propose an ordinance to detach and affect territory of the other municipality. The governing body of the municipality attempting to detach and annex must propose an ordinance to simultaneously detach and annex territory and

then send the ordinance to the governing body of the municipality containing the territory.

2. The ordinance must provide a legal description of the territory and the general reasons for the proposed detachment and annexation.

3, A public hearing must be conducted within sixty (60) days of the proposal of the ordinance. Municipal officials of both municipalities and owners of land located in the subject territory may attend the meeting to present their views.

4. Notice must be published at least fifteen (15) days prior to the public hearing.

5. The governing body of the municipality in which the lands are located may vote on the proposed ordinance. A majority vote in favor of the detachment and annexation will constitute a prima facie case for the action. The proposing municipality may then render services to the area.

6. The decision of the municipal governing bodies is final unless suit is brought in chancery court within thirty (30) days challenging the mutual actions of the municipalities.

7. When the detachment and aunexation is final, residents of the territory are entitled to all rights and privileges as residents within the original limits of the city or town. The municipal clerk or recorder must certify one (1) copy of the plat of the annexed territory and one (1) copy of the ordinance adopted by both governing bodies to the county clerk. A copy of each document shall then he forwarded to the Secretary of State.

DETACHMENT AND ANNEXATION TO OBTAIN MUNICIPAL SERVICES

1. A landowner in/one city or town whose property borders another inunicipality may be permitted to annex his land into the other municipality in order to obtain additional municipal services, such as electricity, water, sewer, fire or police protection, if certain conditions are met. This applies to residential, commercial, industrial, and unimproved land.

2. The landowner must first allow his current city or town the opportunity to provide the desired municipal services following the procedure set out by statute.

3. First, the landowner must file a statement with his current municipality. The statement must state what services are sought.

4. In addition to stating what services are longht, the landowners statement must establish that the municipality is not providing the services. The statement must also state that the land at issue is one (1) area contiguous to another municipality and that the services are available in the bordering municipality.

5. The landowner's current city or town then has thurty (30) calendar days to make a written commitment to

MAINTENANCE OF REAL PROPERTY

5.04.01 Unsightly or unsanitary conditions The town, acting through its designated officials, the Zoning and Planning Commission, may issue a written notice ordering the owner of real property within the town to cut grass or weeds; to remove garbage, rubbish, and other unsightly and unsanitary articles upon the property; to eliminate, fill up, or remove stagnant pools of water or any other unsanitary thing, place, or condition; which might become a breeding place for mosquitoes, flies or germs harmful to the health of the community. (Ord. No. 1.11, Sec. 1.)

5.04.02 Notice to unknown or non-resident owners If the owner or his whereabouts is unknown, or he is a non-resident of the state, then a copy of the written notice shall be posted upon the premises. The Recorder/Treasurer shall publish, mail or deliver the written notice, or an attorney ad litem shall be appointed to notify the defendant by registered letter addressed to his last known place of residence, if it is known. (Ord. No. 1.11, Sec. 2.)

5.04.03 Refusal of owner to comply; lien against the property If the owner, after notice is published, mailed, delivered or served by registered mail to last known place of residence, if known, refuses to remove, abate, or eliminate the unsightly or unsanitary condition after having seven (7) days' notice in writing to do so, then the town is empowered to do whatever is necessary to correct the condition and to charge the cost thereof to the owner. The town will have a lien against the property to secure repayment of its costs. (Ord. No. 1.11, Sec. 3.)

5.04.04 Enforcement of lien for clearance by town At any time within eighteen (18) months after work has been done, the town's lien may be enforced in Circuit Court plus an award of costs and reasonable attorney fees; or may be enforced as a delinquent tax by the County Tax Collector, in accordance with the procedures in ACA 14-54-904. (Ord. No. 1.11, Sec. 4.)

5.04.05 Repair of structure; costs; bidding If a structure is repaired by the town to meet minimum building code requirements, then competitive bidding procedures must be followed. (Ord. No. 1.11, Sec. 5.)

She went on to say that Council needed "someone we can all work with. It's been difficult coming to the meetings." Mayor Kriesel stated that he had asked if anyone on the Council wanted to replace him last December and that there were no takers; however, today, he agreed to resign as soon as someone could be found to replace him.

Pam Teslow moved, seconded by Rick Pennington to accept the minutes as corrected. Vote Unanimous.

Pam Teslow moved, seconded by Bill Padgett, to accept the Treasurer's Report. Vote: Unanimous. Council asked about if the \$198.00 charge for Steve's Septic was a duplicate (open item) (Note: After the meeting, Alderman, Pam Teslow asked that the Recorder/Treasurer bring bills to the next council meeting for approval before writing checks.
